Here are some well known Australian Freemasons:

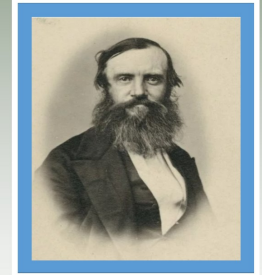


Sydney Airport is named after Aviator — Charles Kingsford Smith. He was known as “Smithy” by his friends.



Sir Donald Bradman an Australian international cricketer is widely acknowledged as probably the greatest batsman of all time.

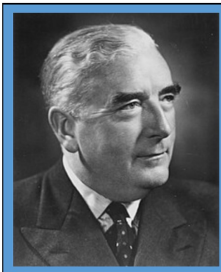
Bradman's career Test Match batting average of 99.94 is considered by many measures as the greatest statistical performance in any major sport.



Freemason John McDouall Stuart is regarded as Australia's greatest inland explorer.

During one of his expeditions he claimed he recognised a masonic greeting when he encountered a party of Aboriginal people.

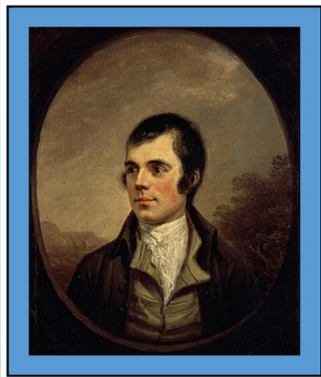
Pilot Charles Kingsford-Smith and Charles Ulm, along with two US crewmen, became the first people to cross the Pacific Ocean by air in their three-engine Fokker aircraft, the Southern Cross. The Southern Cross is on display at Brisbane airport. Charles Kingsford Smith was knighted in 1932.



Sir Robert Menzies was the Prime Minister of Australia from 1939 to 1941 and from 1949 to 1966.

He held office as the leader of the United Australia Party (UAP) in his first term, and subsequently as the inaugural leader of the Liberal Party of Australia. He is the longest-serving prime minister in Australian history.

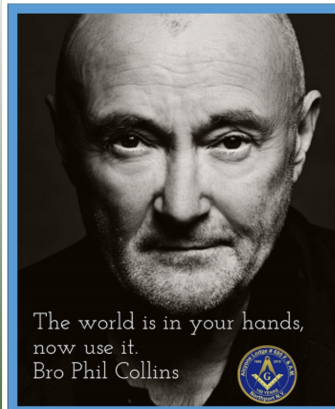

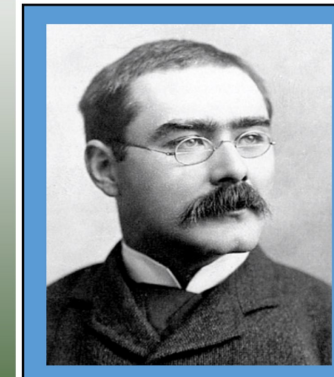
